NWSS plans include new pen division

CSA is preparing for the 2025 National Western Stock Show, including a new pen show division.

A new Phenotype & Genotype (P&G) division will complement the PTP bull and female pen shows already being offered. P&G is designed to create another avenue for exhibitors while increasing the usage of EPDs and economic selection Indexes. The P&G platform, detailed on page 4 of this newsletter plus on the NWSS page of *ColoradoSimmental.com*, will have separate judges who will evaluate first on data, and then later judge the Purebred Simmental bulls live. P&G scores will be equally



weighted at 50 percent, allowing for an educational opportunity to highlight and learn about the value of genotypes as a part of the seedstock selection process.

Our 2025 Denver events also carry the ASA's "National Show" designation. Also note that NWSS officials have flipped some events from previous years, so read the breed events schedule below carefully.

- Sat. 1/18 Bull pen show, with the PTP pen show, the new P&G pen show; and People's Choice judging, all in the yards.
- Sun. 1/19 Female pen show with People's Choice judging; the sale preview and ASA Meet-n-Greet; and *The One & Only* sale with Power Simmental selection, all in the yards.
- Mon 1/20 Open class female and bull shows for a final year in the historic Stadium Arena on the hill.
- Tues 1/21 Junior shows on the hill.

Don't miss out on Fall Focus in nearby Amarillo

Are you headed to Amarillo? If you haven't already, please register for ASA Fall Focus, this year at Amarillo, TX. Last August, CSA & CCA hosted the event in Denver. Again this year, it is nearby, so we again hope to have great attendance from Colorado breeders.

Events begin Friday, Aug. 23, with several days of great educational & networking opportunities.

- August 23 West Texas A&M
 University is opening its doors. A feedlot tour and ultrasound demonstrations will set the stage for a fat cattle trend panel discussion. After a complimentary lunch, tours and a beef sensory panel are available. The evening will include dinner and socializing at Hodgetown Stadium, directly across from the hotel headquarters where the group may cheer on the Amarillo Sod Poodles (AA farm team).
- August 24 The Educational Symposium, featuring session I on end product awareness, with discussions including yield grade challenges, the

beef x dairy opportunities and challenges, the value proposition for beef, and an end product awareness panel. Session II will focus on International Genetic Solutions' multi-breed genetic evaluation. After a complimentary lunch,

session III is the Ogallala Aquifer and water concerns. This afternoon discussion will look at how to extend the aquifer's life. Session IV will focus on the workforce in production agriculture

- and how to connect candidate employees to employers more efficiently. The symposium's finale will be a recognition dinner.
- August 25-27 will include ASA board and committee meetings. Sunday, Aug. 25 will kick off with a town hall meeting, followed by committee meetings. This is your chance to give input to trustees and staff and keep abreast of issues and upcoming efforts. The board meeting will begin mid-Sunday afternoon and continue through Tuesday morning.

Inaugural event for 2025

Colorado Simmental Association will hold a new Simmental Division in the 2025 National Western Stock Show's Simmental bull pen

The new division, called **Phenotype & Genotype** (P&G) will be in ADDITION to



the standard Progress Through Performance (PTP) Purebred and Percentage Simmental pen shows at the National Western Stock Show. Here are the details:

Phenotype & Genotype Pen of 3 Purebred Bulls Division

The objective of adding the Phenotype & Genotype Pen Show (P&G) would be to create another avenue for exhibitors at the National Western Stock Show Simmental Pen Show. With the increased use of Expected Progeny Differences (EPD)s by cattleman, this new division would provide an educational opportunity to highlight and learn about the value of EPDs as well as the Economic Selection Indexes (\$Values) as a part of the Seedstock selection process.

Animals entered in the P&G will be evaluated by a separate division judge & associate judge under a system that combines assessment of the bulls' genotypes (EPDs & \$Values) and phenotypes equally weighted at 50 percent.

- 1. Bulls must be registered Purebred Simmental bulls.
- 2. Animals entered in P&G must have been genomically tested with a DNA sample on file with Igenity Neogen. GE-EPDs are required at the time of NWSS yards check-in.
- 3. Any animals with interim EPDs or EPDs not enhanced with genomic results at time of check-in will not be allowed to show in the P&G Show.
- 4. Bulls exhibited in the new P&G division may be entered for P&G only, or the bulls may be an alternate bull or also be shown in the standard PTP Simmental pen show (either Pen of 3 or Pen of 5).
- 5. As with NWSS rules, the exhibitor must be the breeder of the animal. All other NWSS and Simmental pen rules apply. See the premium book rules for further details.

Judging

- 1. EPDs will be printed for the individual animals as well as the average for their group in the show program.
- 2. The P&G judges will receive judge's cards split into classes that include entry number, birthdate, EPDs/\$Values and percentile
- 3. For the P&G classes, the judges will evaluate in two waves.
- 4. In wave 1, worth 50% of the points, judging will be completed ahead of the show. The judges will:
 - a. Evaluate EPDs/\$Values of CED, BW, WW, YW, Milk, MCE, Doc, Stay, Marb, REA, \$API, and \$TI.
 - b. Place each class based on their genotypic preferences.
 - c. Record their genotypic placings with show officials prior to the public "show day."
- 5. In wave 2, worth 50% of the points, judging will be conducted during the live show. The judges will:
 - a. Evaluate each bull's phenotype.
 - b. Place each live class based on their phenotypic preferences.
 - c. Record their phenotypic placings with show officials.
- 6. Show officials will calculate and display on the public screen both the 50% genotypic placings and the 50% phenotypic placings. The entry with the combined highest score will be the winner of the class.

P&G score card example:

	Genotypic points 50%	Phenotypic points 50%	Total points
Pen entry 50	56	75	131
Pen entry 51	65	52	117
Pen entry 52	70	33	103

So, final placing in the class above is entry 50 is 1st; entry 51 is 2nd, & entry 52 is 3rd.

- 7. In the event of a tie of points, the tie will be broken based on the phenotype placings.
- 8. The judges will then receive a judge's card with the composite placings to talk the class.
- 9. The summary of points for each class will be given to the judges as they select the Grand Champion P&G Bull and Reserve Grand Champion P&G Bull in the division's championship drive.
